
NEW LOCATION

MUUG is moving to a new location to start the new season. Winnipeg Senior Citizens Radio Club (WSC) has graciously offered to host MUUG meetings going forward. Several current and past MUUG members are also members of WSC. MUUG President Wyatt Zacharias will be our WSC liaison and duty officer.

WSC is located at 598 St. Mary's Road, 2nd Floor, a block South from the St. Mary's / St. Anne's fork, on the West side beside the Miller's Meats. It's in the old fire hall, so you really can't miss it! Look for the red doors.

MUUG Mirror Update

The mirrors... they do grow. The mirror on your muug.ca group server filled up once again. Too many distros growing too big too rapidly.

MacPorts had to be sacrificed at the Altar of Spinning Rust. (Alas, no blessed named object appeared.) A study of overall mirror usage showed that MacPorts was infrequently accessed relative to its weighty disk usage (1.9TB).

Past sacrifices included OpenEuler and Project Gutenberg, both for similar reasons of space versus usage. "Pertinence to UNIX and MUUG" are also taken into consideration when deciding what gets the axe. As does "do they have another Canadian mirror".

Absent a very pricey, many-SAS-disk upgrade, MUUG will probably be forced to delete one mirrored distro every year or so. MUUG currently hosts over 50 distros/projects.

The largest distros currently hosted on the server are:

7.1TB opensuse
5.2TB ubuntu-ports
3.6TB ubuntu
3.0TB fedora
2.1TB ubuntu-cdimage
2.0TB debian
2.0TB ubuntu-cloud-images
1.6TB openbsd
1.4TB linux kernel
1.3TB fedora-secondary
1.2TB rocky

Tsk tsk opensuse! What are you doing?! And ubuntu all combined into one... Yikes!

As an interesting aside, ZFS handled 99.99% full much better this time than last time. Perhaps improvements were made? The box was actually still usable. Winning!

GCompris Spricht Deutsch

Children's game / educational tool gcompris, reviewed in the March 2024 MUUGLines, now expanded language support. It has full or near-full support for most major languages; 44 languages in total.

Besides Linux support, it's also now available for Android, iOS, and Windows. However, some subgames don't work well with touch-only interfaces, so the best experience is still on a desktop OS.

Cool PHP: mb_strcut

Every programmer has used substr(), almost universally available in every language – though often with different nomenclature. It allows you to cut a substring of a specified number of bytes (characters) out string.

But then UTF (et al) came along and now bytes weren't necessarily characters anymore (or vice versa), because each character could now be 1, 2, 3 or 4 bytes. This isn't your dad's ASCII, and we aren't (just) in Kansas anymore.

So PHP added mb_substr, just like they did all the other mb_* functions: "substr on multi-byte (mb) strings". Instead of extracting a certain number of bytes, it extracts a certain number of (usually-)UTF-8

characters. It worries about multi-byte boundaries so you don't have to, and you're guaranteed to get a valid UTF-8 string out of it.

But there's a problem: whilst substr returns a known number of bytes. mb_substr does not. If you tell it to extract 4 characters, you could end up with a string that is 4 bytes long, or 16 bytes long!

Sometimes you just really need to know you won't get over a certain number of **bytes**, *and* ensure you still get a valid UTF-8 string. If you just extract byte-wise with substr, you could chop a 4-byte multi-byte UTF-8 character in half. The result, if displayed to a human, could/would be a trailing gibberish character, much like when you try to display 8859 Latin-1 as UTF-8 (been there, done that).

mb_str<u>cut</u> solves this problem by taking the specified length (et al) to be <u>byte</u> counts, just like the original substr. But it adds in the secret sauce of "understanding" the underlying multi-byte character encoding. If a cut position byte is inside a multi-byte character, then the cut is made from the first byte of that character.

What this means in practice is you are guaranteed to get a string that is equal to or less than the number of bytes you specified (as the length) *and* it will still be a valid UTF-8 (or whatever encoding) string. Very handy indeed!

substr("Déjà vu",0,2) \rightarrow d (2B) mb_substr("Déjà vu",0,4) \rightarrow Déjà (6B) mb_strcut("Déjà vu",0,5) \rightarrow Déj (4B)

Brave Blocks MS's Recall

Brave Browser, an alternative privacy-centric web browser, beat everyone to the punch and by default blocks the relatively new "really useful and ultrasafe" Microsoft Windows 11 "feature" **Recall** when using Brave.

If you didn't know, Windows 11 is taking a screenshot of your desktop very few seconds and sending them to who knows where. You know, like your private banking information, passwords, naughty things...

Sure, Microsoft added the ability to disable Recall (they pinkie swear, super cereal!), but 99% of the world won't bother. Of course, 99% of the world isn't using Brave Browser... but for those lucky few, worry not, for Brave was protecting you all along! And if you like the idea of never seeing an ad and having ultimate privacy and security, give Brave a try (and its separate web search engine search.brave.com).
